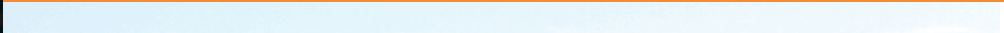
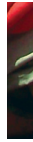

## **Art Crazy:** July 4-8

Explore the fundamentals of drawing, including composition, perspective, basic anatomy, and creating volume and space. Try drawing figures, animals and nature with a variety of drawing media, including pencil, charcoal and pastels.



## **Science @ MTA:** July 11-15

Experiment and explore the wonders of science in a week of jam-packed, hands-on fun. This program will introduce campers to the exciting world of science including forensic science. ## **Geocaching:** July 25-29

Campers work in teams throughout the week while exploring Sackville and the Mount Allison campus. Each day begins with a fun game to

focus on the theme of the day and to encourage team building. On the first day campers will learn the ins and outs of GPS technology and will search for geocaches. As the program continues campers will also learn about multi caches, puzzle caches, virtual caches and other variations of the game.

**Time Travelling:** August 1-5

If you had a time machine, where would you go? Who would you want to talk to? Julius

Caesar? Leonardo da Vinci? Hercules? Elvis? Do you want to go back and see yourself at an earlier age or go forward and see how you look in the future...? Campers will have the “ability” to go to a different time each day, either in the past and the future. It might be a dinosaur hunt, a school for pirates, life in the Wild West or building a stone pyramid on the Nile. As campers travel through time, they will accomplish various tasks from each era.

**Outdoor Survival:** August 8-12

This week long outdoor survival training camp where campers develop skills such as building a fire, constructing a shelter, and identifying plants and animals. Campers will have the opportunity to face a challenging obstacle course that will build confidence and trust in themselves and their team mates.


Children will learn how much can be accomplished by working together to make our town more welcoming.

## Canoeing & Kayaking

The Sackville area boasts both lakes/ivers and coastal canoeing and kayaking opportunities. Lake and river opportunities include Gaspereau River, Silver Lake and Tintamarre National Wildlife Area. For more detailed information on these areas, contact the Sackville Visitor Information 364-4967. Coastal canoeing and kayaking can take place in Shepody Bay, Baie Verte and the Northumberland Strait. Please note that our coastal waters have strong currents in some places.

### Safe Boating Tips

1. Carrying alcohol in any type of boat is illegal.
2. PFDs (Personal Flotation Devices) should be worn by everyone in the boat.
3. All boats should be equipped with a water bailer, flashlight, first aid kit, and whistle in cases of emergency.
4. Be sure to check the weather before heading out.
5. Be sure to inform a friend or relative as to where you will be boating and the approximate time you will be returning.

Safety in our waters begins with being a responsible boater. Being responsible means educating yourself with boating safety & rules, boat operations, and required safety equipment. Smart boaters know that drugs and alcohol do not mix with safe boating. Please make responsible decisions.

## Fishing

Try fishing at the Jolicure Lakes near Jolicure (on the way to PEI) and at Joe Brook, on Mountview Road. Fishing on the Tantramar River in Sackville will also provide opportunities for catching trout and perch. Ice fishing on Silver Lake will reward the patient fisherman with Brown Trout. The local trout season extends from April 15 to September 30. Non-residents must acquire a valid NB Sport Fishing License. Three-day, seven-day and seasonal licenses can be obtained at the Service New Brunswick office in Sackville. Once purchased, these licenses may be used at any NB location.

## Supervised Swimming

The Community Development & Programming Department is pleased to provide lifeguard supervision in the designated swimming area at Silver Lake DAILY from 11am-7pm. All lifeguards are NLS Certified.

This service will be offered from **July 1 - Sept 3**.

## Park Rules

1. An adult **MUST** accompany children under 12 years of age.
2. The supervised swimming area is within the buoys. Anyone who swims outside of the marked area will be doing so at his or her own risk.
3. We strongly advise against individuals swimming during thunder and lightning storms. Those who wish to do so will be swimming at their own risk.
4. All dogs must be kept on a leash. Unleashed dogs will be reported to the dogcatcher and removed at the owner's expense. Park users are advised that the Town of Sackville By-Law #138 (Establishing control of dogs in the Town of Sackville) will be enforced in the park.
5. Foul language and alcoholic beverages are not permitted on park property.
6. There will be no loitering or jumping off the bridge just past the park property.

This is your park. Please keep it clean.

- This is YOUR Park – Please keep it clean

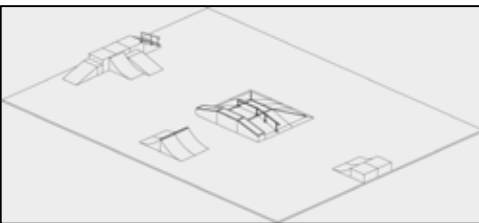

From dawn to dusk, the entertainment never stops at the Sackville Waterfowl Park, a 55-acre park located in the heart of Sackville, and winner of Environment Canada's National Award for Environmental Achievement.

Over three kilometres of trails, boardwalks and viewing platforms lead you, dry shod, through lush stands of alder and cattail and across broad expanses of open water, revealing the private lives of dozens of wetland wildlife species. Bird watching in the Waterfowl Park is best during the dawn and dusk hours of the day.

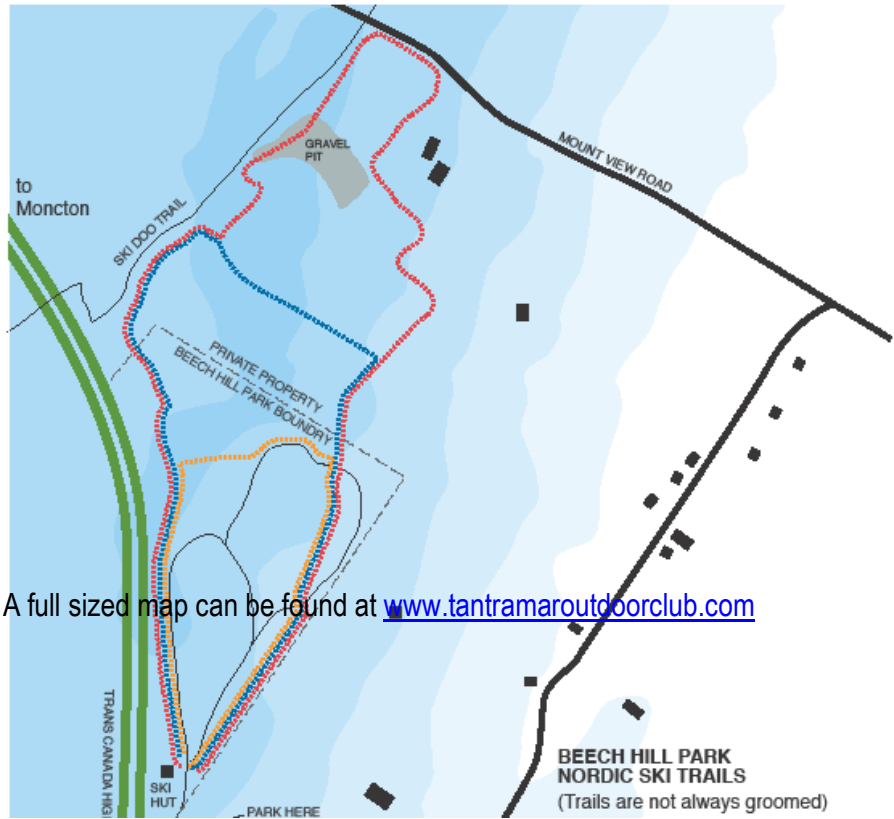
## Beech Hill Park

# Tantramar Rail Trail

This trail links Sackville with the Village of Port Elgin following the route of the Trans Canada/New Brunswick Trail. The Trail begins at the dyked wetland behind Tantramar Regional High School, skirting the Tantramar Marsh. The trail crosses several working farms near Midgic, and then passes through an isolated stretch of boreal forest, before emerging at Highway 16 near the community of Baie Verte. The trail ends at a working fishing wharf on the Gaspereau River in Port Elgin.



Moose, deer, fox, and other woodland creatures can be observed from the trail route, as well as colourful wildflowers and a variety of songbirds, waterfowl and shorebirds, eagles, osprey, hawks and great blue herons can often be seen feeding on the Baie Verte Marsh and along the Gaspereau River Estuary.
